## 'The Bush was Not Consumed: A Rabbinic Reception History of Exodus 3:1-4'

Rabbi Dr Lisa Grushcow (D.Phil. Oxon) is the senior rabbi of Temple Emanu-El-Beth Sholom in Montreal, and a lecturer at McGill University. Her doctoral thesis was published by Brill as Writing the Wayward Life: Rabbinic Interpretations of Sotah (2006). She edited The Sacred Encounter: Jewish Perspectives on Sexuality (2016), and co-edited Communities of Meaning: Conversations on Modern Jewish Life with Larry Hoffman (2023). She is a contributor to the Encyclopedia of the Bible and its Reception and other publications including The Torah: A Women's Commentary (2017), and The Mussar Torah Commentary (2020). She has served as a faculty member for the Shalom Hartman Institute of North America, a member of the McGill Religious Studies Advisory Board, and co-chair of the Montreal Board of Rabbis.

**Abstract:** The revelation at the burning bush is a key moment early in the story of the Exodus. The themes introduced in this passage are central to the larger story: Moses as leader; the nature of the divine; and the situation of the people of Israel. As such, the rabbinic reception history of this first encounter between God and Moses sheds light on how the Exodus story was understood by its interpreters, in their own places and times.
